In Warrnambool to service Barwon South West and Bairnsdale to service Gippsland

Djirra is the Woiwurrung word for the reed used by Wurundjeri women for basket weaving. Traditionally, when women gathered to weave, important talks took place and problems were solved. Djirra symbolises Aboriginal women today, still coming together to share stories, support each other and find solutions.

Djirra is a place where culture is shared and celebrated, and practical support is provided. We are committed to breaking down barriers and finding better ways for Aboriginal women to be safe, access justice and claim equality.
